## Doctors Practice at Kidsgrove Medical Centre is "inadequate"

A report by the Care Quality Commission has found one of the practices operating out of Kidsgrove Medical Centre on Mount Road to be inadequate.



One of the practices operating out of Kidsgrove Medical Centre has been found to be 'inadequate' The practice, Dr Robinson & Partners, have been placed in special measures and will be inspected again in six months, if insufficient improvements are made the providers could have their registration cancelled leading to a closure of the service.

In the report Professor Steve Field, Chief Inspector of General Practice, states, "I am placing this service in special mea-

sures. Services placed in special measures will be inspected again within six months. If insufficient improvements have been made such that there remains a rating of inadequate for any population group, key question or overall, we will take action in line with our enforcement procedures to begin the process of preventing the provider from operating the service. This will lead to cancelling their registration or to varying the terms of their registration within six months if they do not improve.

Special measures will give people who use the service the reassurance that the care they get should improve."

The role of the Care Quality Commission (CQC) as an independent regulator, is to register health and adult social care service providers in England and to inspect whether or not standards are being met. They monitor, inspect and regulate services to make sure they meet fundamental standards of quality and safety and publish their findings. ## Speed humps for Colclough Lane

Stoke City council are to install a set of speed humps along Colclough Lane/Birchenwood Road between Goldenhill and Newchapel to slow down traffic on what has been become a 'Rat Run'.

The country lane is narrow with some sharp bends and needs to be driven with care but many drivers using as it as a short cut avoiding the busier Tunstall Road, Biddulph Road, James Brindley Way route often exceed the 30mph speed limit and a number of accidents have resulted in the last few years.



The move has been welcomed by residents living in the vicinity who claim that drivers frequently speed recklessly and that they have seen numerous accidents over the years.

The speed bumps are planned:

Outside Morley House on Birchenwood Rd;

Outside Fairway on Birchenwood Rd;

Approx 71 metres north of the Scotia Valley Greenway on Birchenwood Road; Approx 98 metres southwest of the junction with Scotia Valley Greenway on Birchenwood Rd.

Councillor Daniel Jellyman, cabinet member for highways, said: "A speed assessment and public consultation has shown there is a need for the bumps to improve road safety. The work will now be completed this financial year. Speed bumps do tend to get a mixed response and it is usually a balancing act between putting them in and the impact they have on road safety."

Parents in Kidsgrove, and right across Staffordshire, have been hugely concerned about plans to cut our school crossing patrols. Our children's' safety is paramount and it has been made clear by parents and campaigners across our county that losing this service would put that at risk.

County councillors have also been dragging their feet when it comes to stepping up and investing in new sporting facilities for the people of Kidsgrove. One and a half years since they cut funding for the swimming pool

ness plan to rebuild it, despite the clear community need.

Previously, Staffordshire County Council have sought to justify these cuts and delays by pleading poverty. There is no doubt that local councils right across the country are feeling the pinch, with millions snatched from community coffers by the Conservative Government since 2010.

So this £5 million cash boost is welcome news. What is needed now is for the County Council to put that extra funding to good use and ensure that our local communities feel the benefit.

This is a relatively small expense for something which makes a huge difference, and if just one child's life is saved as a result then it is worth every penny. You cannot put a price on the safety and wellbeing of our kids

## Lidl submit plans for new Kidsgrove store

Lidl UK have submitted a planning application to bring a new store to Kidsgrove, on land just off Liverpool Road.

If approved the plans willsee the site currently used by Kidsgrove Working Men's Club, and also home to The Canal Tavern, redeveloped into a new Lidl supermarket.

The Working Mens Club, which was founded in 1945 and in its heyday had over 800



members, would relocate to a new site on Meadows Road, close to the railway station in the town centre. Although The Canal Tayern would lose an area of land as part of the proposals, the pub itself would be retained while gaining from the additional footfall to the store and the overall regeneration of the site.

The store could create up to 40 new full and part-time jobs for local people and would include a dedicated in-store bakery, longer style tills with dual packing, a customer toilet, baby changing, and ample parking for both cars and bicycles.

Jo Hawley, Lidl UK's regional head of property, said: "Our multi-million pound plans to bring a new Lidl store to Kidsgrove, on the site currently occupied by Kidsgrove Workingmen's Club, have now been submitted to Newcastle Borough Council for review and consideration.

"The development, if given the green light, will deliver a number of significant benefits to the local area, including the creation of new jobs and the provision of more choice and convenience for those living close by.

"Importantly, the proposals will also enable the relocation of Kidsgrove Workingmen's Club, which has been looking to move to a more appropriate site for some time. We're hopeful that the plans will be heard by the council's planning committee early in the New Year and will keep the local community updated on

## Persimmon plans development of 69 homes on site in Butt Lane

Property developer Persimmon are proposing to develop a site formerly occupied by Celestica in West Avenue, Butt

The site is currently identified as employment land, but hasn't been occupied by a business for many vears.

The proposals is not yet at the planning aplication stage and Persimmon are asking residents for their views before taking it further. A spokesman for Persimmon Homes



Persimmon Homes are proposing to

North West said: "We are currently preparing a full planning application on a parcel of land to the north of West Avenue in Kidsgrove.

"The site is currently vacant, having previously been occupied by Celestica for industrial uses around 10 years ago. Given the lack of market interest in the site being redeveloped for industrial use, it is considered that it can be utilised to deliver homes to meet the area's housing shortage, easing the pressure on Greenfield and Green Belt sites.

"The proposed scheme is for 69 dwellings comprising a mix of townhouses, semi and detached houses. Access is proposed via an extension of the adopted highway at West Avenue into the site. The proposals will also include amenity space and an equipped play area, either as an on-site contribution or as an off-site financial contribution to develop and maintain an amenity space elsewhere in the district.



## Work on station upgrade starts

Work is underway to install new lifts and a footbridge at Kidsgrove station to ensure it's accessible for everyone by spring 2019.



Work is underway to install new lifts and a footbridge at Kidsgrove station

Network Rail has started work on the £5 million Kidsgrove Access for All' upgrade, which will transform the way passengers with all mobility needs use the railway. The vital upgrade will install three new lifts at either side of platforms 1, 2, 3 and 4, as well as a brand new footbridge linking the platforms.

Campaigners have been calling for improvements to access for

nearly 20 years as the only step-free access is to the Manchester-to-Stoke platform (1). Trains to and from Crewe, and to Manchester, can only be accessed via the existing footbridge, making things difficult for people in wheelchairs, those with limited mobility and parents with pushchairs.

The investment has come directly from the Department for Transport's 'Access for All' programme, which was launched in 2006 to improve accessibility at railway stations nationwide, and forms part of our five-year, multi-billion pound Railway Upgrade Plan, which is the biggest investment in the railway since the Victorian era

This programme of work will not be disruptive to travel, but the station will look and feel different whilst the work is being carried out.

Luke Jones, Network Rail scheme project manager, said: "This upgrade will unlock the railway network for many people in Kidsgrove, allowing them easy access to travel that was previously not possible.

"We are working closely with the station operator, East Midland Trains, to ensure our work brings as little disruption as possible to passengers at the station, which will only be until late spring 2019."






### Kidsgrove Rotary's 50th charter anniversary

We are aiming to set up a charity shop in the town where items sold will raise money that we can plough back into the town and all its surrounding areas.









## KIDSGROVE TIMES WITH PHILIP LEESE A 'LOST' LADY FROM LINLEY

I hope you all survived the tinsel season. I just gave up on local history in late November and devoted myself to herding flocks of mince pies past my gnashers. I did buy two books for myself as Christmas presents, but didn't get round to them. Instead local history came creeping back in via an unexpected book I found in my stocking one morning, entitled "Staffordshire Women: Nine Forgotten Histories" by Pam Inder and Marion Aldis.

You may remember that I was lamenting the lack of historical evidence about the female contribution to history back in 2017, and that word 'forgotten' in the subtitle tells me that other historians have noticed this too. The authors have attempted to give some public recognition to a selection of 18th and 19th Century ladies who, in one way or another, led their own lives. They admit that none were exceptionally talented - we're not talking about unknown Charlotte Brontes or Florence Nightingales here – but they did establish businesses or supported themselves either in the absence of men or when linked to incompetent ones. Some are from North Staffordshire – a pottery paintress, not surprisingly, came from Longton, another subject was born in Newcastle, though she then moved to Colwich near Stafford, Jane Sneyd, nee Debank was a native of Leek, as was Hannah Astles, who worked there in the silk trade. But my interest was largely caught by a lady novelist born in Linley Hall near to Butt Lane and Talke. She owned the site on which St. Saviours Church and School were built, both of which I attended in my youth.

I wonder how many of you will know the name of this lady, who wrote

about 20 books including two for children and two on history, some of which were published in America, France and Germany? Mind you, I suspect they are all out of print now, being first published between 1834 and 1866.

Some of you may know the name Marsh-Caldwell — or at least the Caldwell part of it from the Caldwell Arms (currently the Toby Carvery), but it's not surprising that the name of Anne Marsh-Caldwell isn't as familiar as Jane Austen or those Brontes, because (except in America) she did not publish them under her

own name. Nearly all were headed as "By the Author of.... the previous one." And guess why? Because a man didn't want her to become famous. Her story speaks clearly about the relative position of men and their wives in 19th Century England.

Anne Caldwell was born in 1791 and grew up at Linley Hall, daughter of Attorney John Caldwell, who bought the Linley Estate in 1789 and built himself a large house called variously Linley Wood or Hall. She was educated at home by various tutors and even a visiting Dancing Master, acquiring Philosophy, French, Italian and Religious Knowledge.

She began writing a mix between a diary and a homework book and, when 16, had written some stories, which she was encouraged to publish by her aunt. However none were published for at least 25 years, during which time she married, in 1817, Arthur Cuthbert Marsh, perhaps meeting him because he was a friend of her brother's. The big drama occurred in 1824, when the Bank her husband was a partner in, and which was owned by his family, went bankrupt in spectacular fashion, leaving huge debts incurred by a dishonest, tricksy employee. Arthur C. Marsh was partly responsible for these debts. This happened, just as the couple lost their first son in infancy, and yet it seems as if it was Anne who took charge and rescued the situation. A short while afterwards, they moved to Boulogne, possibly to avoid creditors.

But somewhere along the line Anne took up writing again, and eventually showed the result to Harriet Martineau, a prominent member off London literary circles, who urged her to publish it. So, thinking this might help ease their financial troubles, Anne discussed it with her husband. He agreed, but only on condition that she remained anonymous, and that he negotiated with publishers in order to conceal her identity. At the time, of course, the husband was seen as the mainstay of a family, and legally, a wife's money and property (apart from sentimental items and some family heirlooms) were his. The authors of the book suggest that Arthur, seen as a failure in the banking world, would be made to feel even more insignificant, if his wife were to be known to be supporting the family with her earnings.

So, when "Two Old Men's Tales" was published in 1834, the author's name was not on the cover or title page, and when, two years later "Tales of Woods and Fields" came out, it was "By the Author of 'Two Old Men's Tales" Thereafter that was the pattern. In 1845 "Mount Sorel" was announced as 'By the author of Emilia Wyndham, etc., etc.' I am

somewhat astonished that her first book was so successful that it went into a second edition and was published in America too, because who would particularly wish to read stories about two old men? The reviews must have made clear that the book actually contained two melodramatic stories, supposedly narrated by old men. Should you wish to set your pulses racing (but respectably, of course!) there is a copy of a reprint of 'Two Old Men's Tales' at Kidsgrove Library. You can enjoy yourself agonizing over the fate of the noble but disabled Earl of Saint Germains whose love affair is poisoned by his wicked stepmother. Her plot to kill him is finally scotched when her own son is hit by lightning on his 21st birthday and falls dead at her feet. Not exactly an everyday story of country folk then, and one that presumably bears little relation to Anne Marsh-Caldwell's early life at Linley Hall. Still it will give you an idea of what Georgian and early Victorian ladies looked for in their light reading.

And in the manner of a melodrama, I shall leave you in suspense about the rest of her career as an author, till the next edition of 'Kidsgrove News' as I think I am about out of space. Expect the end of this 'old man's tale' in the next issue!




"I'm was so humbled by the amount of shoeboxes that were made up by customers and staff at Tesco Kidsgrove.






