Cheshire East Council launches 'Warm PlaCEs' scheme

Cheshire East Council has officially launched a 'Warm PlaCEs' scheme to help with the cost-of-living crisis.

'Warm PlaCEs' are spaces where people can go, free of charge, to spend time to keep warm if they are struggling to heat or keep their homes warm. As a result of increasing energy prices there is concern that many households may be unable to heat their homes sufficiently this winter.

The council has invited voluntary, community and social enterprise groups to join the 'Warm PlaCEs' programme. Organisations can apply for a grant of £250 or £1000 to help set up or improve an existing warm space for their community this winter. Businesses can also register their interest in supporting the 'Warm PlaCEs' scheme.

Councillor Sam Corcoran, leader of Cheshire East Council, said: "The ongoing cost-of-living crisis is having significant impacts nationally and the council anticipates seeing increasing financial pressure on residents, businesses, and community organisations across Cheshire East.

"In the participating connected community centres residents can meet, keep warm, enjoy light social activities, and find out about ways in which people can help each other, alongside a warm meal and/or a hot drink. Useful information and advice on reducing household bills, saving energy, and tackling debt will also be available. Residents who are simply looking for somewhere warm and comfortable to sit are also welcome in the 'Warm PlaCEs' across Cheshire East.'

It is recognised that many families struggling to pay their fuel bills, may also be experiencing food poverty and social isolation, and so the intention of this scheme is to provide free, public places where people can go to get warm, save money on their heating costs, avoid social isolation, receive vital support and advice while staying as well as possible, wherever you live and whatever your circumstances.



Working with partners, the council will also be providing a range of free winter wellbeing items to those who may need extra support. This includes warm clothing, hand warmers, duvets, hot water bottles and energy saving products. The council will continue to provide essential food and fuel vouchers through Emer-

Chair of Alsager in Bloom, Cllr June Buckley, said she was delighted the group had won the coveted award. She said, "*It reflects just the amazing work done by this community group and others in the town.*"

She continued, "The judges were impressed with all the work being done in Alsager and the fact we're moving away from just gardening."

"This year at Alsager In Bloom we very much followed the guidance of the North West In Bloom team.

"We focused on environment and sustainability.

Therefore areas of scrubland can be just as important as a manicured garden the importance of water in gardens is vital, even if it's only a small bowl filled with pebbles and topped up with water in a heatwave is invaluable for helping to keep bees and other insects alive, although they're not terribly glamorous, they are vitally important.

"We wish to continue this work along with our fabulous hanging baskets in the town, and the town council are now supervising this. Plus the work of other groups with a sustainability group. Friends of Milton Park, Rotary Club, and also the Gardens Association plus many of others have helped us to achieve what we have.

"Finally, for the first time, since the pandemic struck in 2020, I would like to re-engage with all our schools, primary schools and high school, to encourage them into joining us doing this fabulous work."

CHAIRMAN'S CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

One thing has remained constant through the upheavals and difficulties of recent years and that is the community spirit that makes Alsager such a great place to live. We saw it during the worst days of lockdown when so many volunteered to help friends and neighbours. We saw it as the high street began to recover, with people returning to the library, Alsager Civic and the shops, bars, restaurants and businesses. We saw it at the terrific Music Festival and many other events. It continues through all the tremendous support Alsager people are giving to Ukrainian and other guests from around the world.

Times may be hard, but our small town continues to punch above its weight as a key service centre. We outperform some larger towns in our area in relation to our size. As Chair of Alsager Town Council, I often hear comments from across the Borough and the County more widely about our reputation as a friendly and caring community.

This last year we have seen Alsager's Community Support Centre receive a well-deserved Queen's Award, one of the last Her late Majesty signed. We saw a sizeable crowd gather outside the Civic for the Proclamation of the Ascension of King Charles III. It was a privilege to read the Royal Proclamation on that historic occasion

We live in times when budgets are tight and when essential services are squeezed and constrained. Nevertheless, we are seeing various improvements such as the refurbishment of Hassall Road Play Area and the impending provision of inclusive play equipment at Milton Park and the Fair View Play Area.

This coming year we will see Alsager extend its 'political' boundaries to the M6 to the west and across the Twyford's estate to the east. We will see elections for the Town and Cheshire East Councils. We will see some councillors moving on and others elected. There will be more changes, more challenges. It is people not politics that makes communities. Alsager Town Council will continue to do what it can to assist that process.

When to apply?

The Town Council's Grants Panel will meet twice during the year, in January and October, all applications must be submitted to the Town Council by 30 December or 30 September respectively in order to be considered for funding.

When will we know if we have been successful?

If the Grants Panel recommend the grant application for approval this will be considered by either the Town Council's Finance Committee or the Full Council at its next available meeting. And if successful, payment will be made after that meeting.

Budget setting 2023-24

As with every business, organisation and individual, budget setting for the forthcoming year will be a difficult task for the Town Council. The Town Council is responsible for 4 allotment sites, the public toilets, Alsager Civic and is also sole trustee of



Alsager Institute. Increased utility costs, cost of living and potential loss of revenue may result in some tough decisions to be made by Councillors.

Each committee has considered its income and expenditure requirements with the collated draft budget being taken to the Finance Committee on 13 December 2022 for consideration. Following the meeting, the draft budget for the year 2023-24 will be updated to incorporate any changes recommended by the Finance Committee and will be received at the Town Council meeting on 10 January 2023 for approval, and the precept requirement submitted to Cheshire East Council.

The Town Council welcomes scrutiny by members of the public with public participation at each Council meeting to give an opportunity for residents to make a statement or ask questions. The draft budget will be posted on the Town Council website in early December at www.alsagertowncouncil.gov.uk. A version will be available at the Town Council offices for inspection.




dog, Vicky played a vital role as her sighted guide and


