


Standing up for Stoke-on-Trent North, Kidsgrove & Talke



Since my last column in September commemorating the reign of Her Late Majesty The Queen, the picture in Westminster has changed significantly.

Rishi Sunak, our new Prime Minister, has brought the political stability this country needs in these immensely challenging times. Around the world, financial volatility means countries must adapt to ensure they can cope with the economic challenges brought about by Putin's invasion of Ukraine.



The Conservatives took decisive action in September to deal with the prospect of £6,000 energy bills through introducing the Energy Price Cap which should mean the average household saves £1000, on top of the £400 per household and £150 for Council Tax properties band A-D. Eligible pensioners and those on means tested benefits will also get an additional £650 to-

wards their energy bills in cash.

I have continued to fight hard for the issues that the people of Stoke-on-Trent North, Kidsgrove and Talke care deeply about. As you may have seen in the local media, the whole community and I are outraged by the insultingly lenient sentence given to the killer of Sharlotte-Sky Naglis in October. I have been working with her inspiring mother, Claire, to challenge this sentence with the Attorney General - the most senior lawyer in the Government.

We have referred the case to the Unduly Lenient Licence Scheme, which chal-

lenges cases that are inadequate. It is a grave insult to Sharlotte's memory that Mr Owen was given just six and a half years in prison, with only two and a half years behind bars. Most recently, I have met with the Solicitor General and am looking at securing a meeting with the Prime Minister as early as possible. I am speaking in Westminster Hall to challenge this harrowing sentence. I hope that ongoing pressure will demonstrate to the Attorney General the gravity of the situation and ensure Mr Owen is punished for the abhorrent act he committed.

Furthermore, I am excited that the new and improved CCTV for Kidsgrove I campaigned for will be coming soon. The current CCTV is old and out of date, and we urgently need this new CCTV to deter those criminals who try ruin the area we are so proud of. Stokeon-Trent City Council have been paid for the system.

I am certain that the new systems will be incredibly useful for the brave members of Staffordshire Police who work tirelessly to keep us safe. Councillor Paul Waring is determined to fix the mess left over by Labour and make streets in Kidsgrove far safer. It is fantastic news, given the overwhelming support the campaign received from residents in Kidsgrove.

Lastly, I hope everyone signs up for the Kidsgrove Sports Centre which opened in July 2022. It is at the heart of the community and has excellent facilities to socialise with family and friends whilst improving physical and mental wellbeing.

The cost of energy and food is so high now. I'm worried about how I'll put food on the table. I'm on a prepayment meter and I'm really scared we're going to be left without any gas or electric if I can't top up. What can I do?

First of all, I'm really sorry to hear how tough things have been for you. You're doing the right thing in reaching out for support and there are things you can get help with.

As a prepayment meter customer, your energy supplier will be able to give you temporary credit if you can't

afford to top up your meter. They might add this to your meter automatically, but if they don't, you can call them and ask them to do this. If you run out of temporary credit, speak to your supplier to explain your situation. They may give you extra temporary credit if you're struggling with living costs.

There are other reasons why they might give you extra credit too, including if you're disabled, have a long-term health condition, or you have children under the age of 5. You'll have to pay back anything extra you get, but you can agree how to do this in a way you can afford with your supplier.



As you say, the cost of living is really high but there is help available. You might also be able to get a fuel voucher, which you can use to add credit to your meter. Contact your local council about this.

There was more government support in October, including a £400 payment to help you with your energy bills. If you have a prepayment meter, you'll be given vouchers in the first week of each month from October, via SMS text, email or post. Make sure your energy company has your up-to-date details.

To help manage other costs, it's also worth checking you're getting all the benefits you're entitled to. There are benefits calculators you can use online. On the Citi-

zens Advice website, there's advice on how to reduce living costs and information on other ways to increase your income.

The school holidays can be a really tough time and we know the food shop isn't stretching as far. Contact your local council to find out what extra support you can get over the holidays. If you can't afford to buy food, your local Citizens Advice can help you get a referral for a food bank

We know this is an extremely worrying time and everyone's situation is different. Don't struggle alone. If you need further support, contact your local Citizens Advice or call the national advice line: 0800 144 8848

Wow! It is hard to believe that Kidsgrove Sports Centre has now been open for over 100 days and still going strong! The level of support from the local community is truly remarkable and testament to the importance of community leisure facilities, like those which we have at the Sports Centre.

You have probably heard in the media that it is currently a hugely difficult time for community leisure operators, especially those like ourselves who have a swimming pool. Nationally 2 pools a week on average are closing as the cost of energy is having a serious impact on such vital facilities. To put this into context, for ourselves our monthly utilities bill is £35,000 (Yes, THIRTY FIVE THOU-SAND POUNDS A MONTH!!) and as a charity we are solely dependent on the revenue the centre can generate from all of our members and users. It is why we really value the support from our members - because our facility really is owned and operated by our community, for our community! It is going to undoubtedly be a challenging period ahead, however we know our remarkable community will ensure we ride out these challenges.

We have had a fantastic Half Term, in which we saw over 150 children take part in at least one of our Half Term Activities. We know how well received these were and we will be looking to offer many more of these in the future. In addition to this, our swimming pool inflatable (Bumble Trouble) made its first appearance this Half Term to much excitement of many children (and adults). We were delighted with the response to

these sessions and will be looking to introduce more of these in the future.

It is also amazing to be able to report that all 8 of our trainee lifeguards passed their assessment course and will be poolside in Kidsgrove very shortly. In keeping with our community values, this scheme has focused on volunteers and providing new skills and opportunities. Our lifeguard course was unique, by offering a free qualification for anyone who was willing to then offer some time back

to volunteer as a lifeguard at our swimming pool. It is the power of volunteers which make our facility special and we really value them as an integral part of our facility.



The challenges that come about where budgeting is concerned is a 365-day thing, and the realities of managing our money are not aided by this simple fact - many people are appalling 'budgeters'!

Budgeting also leads us to make many assumptions. The biggest problem that people have is they look across the month at what they typically pay for things.

So, they'll look at their food bills, their utilities, their mortgage, car lease and all those things, and that's all good and well. But you know what, the average family in the UK spends £600 on Christmas, which is £50 a month. They buy a new sofa every three or four years for maybe £1,000. They buy a television that is £300. They go on holiday, and so on.

The fact is, rarely are these costs factored into monthly spend, but they should be. We need to break down those big amounts into a monthly cost, across the whole year, and add that to our monthly figures.

I have a tool called the 'Budget Planner' which is free to use on my website it helps you balance the incomings and the outgoings, and factors in these big amounts, as well as the ones we tick off week by week.

Of course, there are many other excellent planners out there, and I'd encourage people to use them.



Ultimately, the way I suggest people manage their money is by using a system I call 'Piggybanking'. It involves moving things into hypothetical 'accounts'.

So, let's say you have your 'Standard Bills' account, which is all the regular bills you need to pay each month; you have your 'Holidays' account - you know you spend £1,000 a year on a holiday and that's about £85 a month. You have your 'Christmas' account and you have your 'Big One-offs' account. Those are examples, but use whatever is personal to you.

Each month when you get paid, you siphon the right

amount of money into the Bills account, you put the right amount of money into the Holidays account, the right amount of money in the Christmas account, and

That way, when you look in your bank account it tells what you can truly spend

So rather than spending £800 on a perceived £500 weekend break (£300 of which you cannot afford, but you tell yourself you'll "manage somehow"), your Holidays account will categorically confirm to you that you have, say, £512 to spend.


If you're spending more than £512, you cannot afford it, so you have to cut your cloth accordingly.

Many people swear by this technique, lots of people swear at it too, but it truly works!

In the current climate, budgeting has never been more important, particularly if you can add in another account called Contingency.

We can't compensate for what's around the corner, but being equipped to confront it will make you feel good about your finances, your life, and your prospects of overcoming that financial bump in the road.

TALES MY GRANDMOTHER TOLD ME

Well, now that the Kidsgrove book is complete (almost) and being looked at by the possible publishers to see if it's worthy of a special limited edition bound in ecologically friendly artificial bat-leather as well as the cheap paperback version, I and the U3A local history group have turned our attention for a while towards Talke and Butt Lane.

The first item we found in the big blue folder labelled 'Talke and Talke Pits' at the library was a sheet entitled 'Stories and Legends of the Talke Area.' No author. No date.

This and some other information in there reminds me that one of the biggest problems for a local historian is what I call 'The Unattributed Fact.' Or, more commonly, 'Well, my grandmother told me that.....' She once told someone that Jamage Road was built by the Romans. Have you heard that one?

For most of us, we can go along with that. After all there were Romans at

Chesterton and at Middlewich and Chester, and as Talke is on the route between them, and as Romans marched on Roman roads, it stands to reason that a Roman road ran through Talke. Granny says so, or possibly Bill at the pub. But the historian needs to know who told your Granny (or Bill) this? Was it an actual ancient Roman, who knew every inch of the route be-

cause of the bunions on his sandalled feet? Well, no, because Granny was not old enough to have spoken to a Roman (and he'd have been talking latin so she wouldn't understand him anyway.) So there must have been a chain of people who passed the story down, unless Granny made it up. Historians are annoying, pernickety people who want to know exactly who told who and when. In other words, who told Granny? If we can't find that out, such supposed historical facts count as gossip.

It's not just the Romans. Did you know that, according to another of these anonymous sheets, Talke is named Talke o'th'Hill because when King Charles I or II was staying at Lawton Hall during the civil war, on hearing that enemy forces were approaching, he suggested that they climb the nearest eminence, and have a talk on the hill (Get it?) so as to be able to see from which direction the Roundheads were coming and thus plan which was the best direction to run away. The story would be more likely if we could find that King Charles ever stayed at Lawton Hall, which we can't, and in any case the name Talke Upon the Hill is mentioned in a document of 1612, which is a while before the civil war. The same goes for the story that crimson tides of blood flowing downhill following a battle were the origin of the name Red Street. Cooling and congealing, it formed a sticky pool at Jammage, too. Except that Jammage started out life as Gem Edge, and there's no trace of this supposed battle.

Was Green Lane, a row of houses facing the Birchenwood works on Kidsgrove Bank, so-called because of the number of Irish workers who lived there?

Local history is littered with such 'facts' as these. They arise because of the strong human tendency to find direct common-sense explanations for whatever is around them. Green Lane, for instance, a row of houses facing the Birchenwood works on Kidsgrove Bank was socalled because of the number of Irish workers who lived there at one time. Trouble is.

that when I look on the census returns for 1841 and 51, when it was already called Green Lane, there are no Irish present at all. Later on, when there was a sprinkling of Irish workers the name may have been more appropriate, but as an origin story, it won't wash. Ditto for the well-known fact that when James Brindley was living in Turnhurst Hall he built himself a model canal lock in his back garden. People used to recall seeing it, and it's shown on maps. The trouble is that the long thin pool was shown on maps dating to before when Brindley lived there. Still, you can't keep a good story down. There's now a pub called Brindley's Lock, so it must have existed!

It is possible that some of these undatable, unattributable facts are true, or part true, but historians have to be very careful about allowing them to stand. Amongst the information in the Talke File, are statements that Harecastle Farm (now the Miller and Carter) used to be surrounded by a moat, that there was a set of stocks by the cross at Talke, and that Bishops Field was so called because a horse named Bishop was buried in it at some time or other. Maybe these things are true, but if you have any proof of any of them, please get in touch. There is a lot of history we will never be able to confirm or deny, simply because the facts were never recorded, or, if they were, the documents have been lost.

Perhaps the best example of the problem of Attributable Datable Information as regarding Talke's history, is the stone market cross standing opposite the

Queen's Head and the Swan. Talke, according to an unimpeachable source in 1252 was granted the right to hold a weekly market, and a posher three-day market every year near St.Martin's Day in November. To prove it we still have the base of the old market cross, which was restored in 1887. But did the farmers from round about bring their ducks, geese, hens, sheep, cheese, bacon and onions every week to spread out in the open space by the Church and public houses? And was there a regular three-day event every November with travelling showmen, ballad sellers, and journeymen with more exotic goods like ribbons, lace, linen, saddlery and so on?



Well, except for a brief mention, in the newspaper accounts of a gunpowder explosion nearby in 1781, when it was reported that fewer people died in the blast because many of them were at the market at the top of the hill, there is no other known mention of markets at Talke between 1252 and 1781, about 500 years. So perhaps the original market only lasted a few years, or maybe folks just got quietly on with it all those silent centuries without every telling anyone in a letter, or newspaper report or other document. I wonder whether Granny knows... Or I could ask Old Bill, if he still goes into the Swan.




